Duck hunters may access public areas to repair blinds

POCAHONTAS – Waterfowl hunters who make use of public duck blinds on several northeast Arkansas public hunting areas will soon get their chance to perform maintenance work on these public blinds. Sportsmen may access Big Lake, St. Francis Sunken Lands and Dave Donaldson Black River WMAs from Aug. 16 through Aug. 31, to maintain public duck blinds, waterfowl hunting holes and boat lanes.

There are no blinds on Dave Donaldson Black River WMA, but public hunting holes may be maintained on that WMA. Access is scheduled for an earlier period than past years after comments from local residents. The later dates conflicted with a peak in farming activities. Maintenance will only be allowed into the areas during daylight hours. Permits will not be required.

Maintenance may be done under the following guidelines:

- All blinds located on Commission owned or controlled property are public property and are available for use by the public on a first come first served basis. Blinds may not be locked at any time and may not be reserved in advance for future use regardless of previous use, maintenance or construction history.
- Maintenance and use of public duck blinds is at the users own risk. The Commission assumes no



liability for personal injuries, damages or loss of property by anyone entering or hunting from public blinds.

- Only blinds that are in good condition may be maintained. Blinds that have been destroyed or are no longer safe or serviceable may not be rebuilt.
- Maintenance is limited to repairs necessary to keep the structure in a safe and serviceable condition. Construction of new blinds is not permitted and existing blinds cannot be enlarged or replaced or moved.
- Blinds determined by the AGFC to be unsafe, unserviceable, or to have been illegally built, moved or altered will be permanently removed.
- Certain levees and roads usually open to vehicular traffic may be closed because of construction or logging operations on Big Lake and Dave Donaldson/Black River. Only ATVs will be permitted beyond signs, locked gates or barricades for maintenance purposes.
- Identification numbers that have been placed on or near blinds are not to be removed or painted over.
- Boats; three wheeled, four wheeled, six wheeled or eight-wheeled all terrain vehicles may be used on existing roads or trails to access blinds or hunting areas. Trailers may be used with ATVs to transport repair materials and/or equipment to blind locations.
- No trucks or other passenger vehicles, farm tractors or implements, including implements for use with four-wheelers, riding mowers or power mowers may be used.
- No chemicals, herbicides or defoliant may be used.
- Chainsaws will be permitted only for the cutting of fallen logs from boat lanes, trails and hunting spots.
- No trees are to be cut, regardless of size.
- No new holes or clearings are to be created.
- Soil may not be plowed, cultivated or disturbed in any manner and no seeds of any kind are to be planted.
- Cutting of trees, application of chemicals or defoliant, or the enlargement or creation of new openings will result in the permanent closure of that location to hunting.
- No maintenance may be done in areas that have been closed to hunting by painted boundaries or signs, and any blind that is in a location that has been permanently closed to waterfowl hunting because of illegal activity will be permanently removed.
- Blinds may not be relocated or moved from GPS coordinates established by the AGFC. This includes floating structures. All other wildlife management area rules and regulations established by the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission are applicable. Hunters should refer to the 2007-2008 waterfowl regulations guidebook prior to hunting.

The use of all-terrain vehicles for off road travel is restricted to persons actively participating in blind or hunting hole maintenance, and mobility impaired access permit holders as permitted by area regulations. Joy riding is prohibited and violators will be prosecuted.

Bass fishing bounces back along lower Arkansas River

PENDLETON – Bass fishing on the lower portion of the Arkansas River has rebounded, as evidenced by the 2008 Big Bass Bonanza.

From an area of disappointment for anglers in the last 20 years or so, the river and its renowned tributaries and backwaters is producing much better black bass – largemouth and spotted – according to fishermen who competed in this years bonanza and according to fisheries biologists with the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission.

There appears to be larger bass and more bass, the two ingredients that go a long way to bringing smiles to fishermen.

Biggest smile may be on the face of Duke Gunnell of Benton, who won this year's Big Bass Bonanza with



an 8.14-pound largemouth. One observer called it “a really good-looking bass.”

Gunnell’s catch beat out John Higman of Evansville, who caught a bass weighing 7.81 pounds at the other end of the Big Bass Bonanza waters, the Fort Smith pool.

The Pendleton pool yielded the Bonanza’s third largest fish, 7.32 pounds by Steve Blasengame of Star City, Twelve bass weighing between 6 and 7 pounds were also checked in at Pendleton.

Kevin Hopkins, AGFC’s assistant black bass program biologist, was on hand at the Pendleton weigh-in site for the Bonanza when Gunnell brought his fish to the scale. Hopkins said, “We have had a good spawn down in this part of the river this year. The bass seem to be improving from all reports.”

Alan Melder of Monticello, the Bonanza weighmaster at the site, nodded agreement and said, “It’s not only this tournament; other tournaments are telling us that the (bass) fishing is better in this part of the river. In the one-day tournaments, 7 to 10 pounds (for a 5-bass tournament limit) were winning, and now it takes 12 to 15 pounds to win one of these tournaments.”

Gunnell is a veteran bass chaser. He has often been among the prize winners in the Big Bass Bonanza and led it for two days in 2005 before being bumped to runner-up. This year, he fished the first two days on the Dardanelle pool of the river then moved to the Pendleton pool the last day.

He went to Post Lake, an oxbow water next to Arkansas Post National Memorial. But Gunnell and his partner, Hugh Burnett of Little Rock, moved away from a crowd of other competitors who were fishing in open water near the edge of lily pads. Gunnell and Burnett went deep into the thick lily pads. One bass exploded at Gunnell’s white plastic frog but missed. Not long after that, another bass softly sucked in the lure then put up a stiff fight when Gunnell set the hook.

The widespread of the lower Arkansas River and its backwaters has long been magnets for bass fishermen. Some of the areas are well-known to anglers in the state and from other areas. Coal Pile, Merrisach, Moore’s Bayou, Post Lake, Morgan Point and Notrebe’s Bend are familiar in fishing conversations.

A largemouth bass from Coal Pile, which got its name in 19th century steamboat days, was the state record at 13 pounds, 4 ounces, until the current record of 16-4 was caught in 1976 at Mallard Lake in northeast Arkansas.

AGFC accepting applications for wildlife officers

LITTLE ROCK – Looking for a career change or the opportunity to work in specialized fields of enforcement? The Arkansas Game and Fish Commission could be just the place for you.

From now until Aug. 31, the AGFC is taking applications for its next class of wildlife officers. Becoming a wildlife officer is much more than just checking hunting and fishing licenses.

Does your mind’s eye conjure up images of a uniformed man or woman talking to a 4-H group? Being interviewed on television? Assisting other law enforcement officers, as the situation requires: on a manhunt or natural disaster? If not, you probably don’t have a realistic



picture of what being a wildlife officer is all about, says Colonel Chris Carpenter, chief of the Commission's enforcement division. "The picture that invariably comes to mind when you try to visualize a wildlife officer is one of a guy writing a citation to a violator. But that's just a small part of the job our 160 wildlife officers do," Carpenter explains.

The opportunity is available to work in specialized fields of enforcement such as the K-9 Unit, Dive Team and Special Operations Unit. The Commission is always looking for bright, versatile, highly motivated men and women to apply for jobs as wildlife officers. The competition is strong for these jobs. Normally, one out of every 20-25 qualified applicants will be accepted for employment.

Bighead carp claims unrestricted state record

STUTTGART - A 70-pound fish on the end of bowfishing line conjures tales of the Amazon or maybe Africa.

Greg Mitchell's tale comes from Arkansas County.

Mitchell, of Roe, got a draw on a 70-pound, 8-ounce bighead carp July 31 and managed to land it near Wilson Bridge on Wilson Road. His fish – 51 inches from nose to tail – is the state-record bighead carp taken with unrestricted tackle.

Wilson weighed the fish at the Stuttgart Post Office and it was verified by Lee Holt, an Arkansas Game and Fish Commission fisheries biologist.



Gene Denton has enjoyed, worked for turkeys for decades

CLARKSVILLE – Turkeys are a way of life for Gene Denton of Clarksville. He's been an avid turkey hunter nearly all his life, and he's worked for years locally, regionally and nationally on improving habitat and other phases of the American turkeys.

He joined the National Wild Turkey Federation in 1975, not long after the organization was founded, and became a member of its board of directors in 1980. He has played a key role in the growth of NWTF into a major and effective conservation organization. Denton and NWTF have been instrumental in a number of Arkansas habitat improvement and expansion projects.

Denton joins the late Carl Hunter of Alexander and Marion McCollum of Stuttgart as 2008 inductees into the Arkansas Outdoor Hall of Fame. The annual Outdoor Hall of Fame banquet and fund raising will be Friday, Sept. 5, at Statehouse Convention Center in Little Rock.

It is understandable that the Denton home just outside Clarksville has a turkey motif.

Denton grew up in the Little Rock vicinity in the era when turkeys were scarce. But enough were in Arkansas' woods that they fueled a challenging pursuit for hunters. The stories abounded, too, of turkey chases and frustrations for past generations of outdoors people.



Turkey hunters have to call in a gobbler to get a shot, and Denton learned this necessity early. There are several different types of turkey calls in addition to a few hunters who do it with voice alone. He has tried all the types and still uses more than one, depending on the situation.

Denton said, "I started off when I was young just using a piece of slate and a wood peg." He explained that this is a simple method, but like the other types, it takes practice and close attention to produce a noise closely resembling a hen turkey in the woods.

After Marine Corps service, Denton went into electrical work, traveling to many parts of the nation on industrial and distribution system projects. He also became extensively involved in electrical workers union activities.

In 1975 Denton heard of a new organization called the National Wild Turkey Federation, and he liked its approach to the conservation and habitat issues associated with wildlife. Turkeys were improving in Arkansas with restocking work going strong.

Five years later, Denton was asked to serve on the NWTF's board of directors, and he's been a part of it since. Step by step, on small projects and on large campaigns, NWTF has made significant impacts on turkeys and especially their habitat all across North America.

Denton has been heavily involved in three major programs for the turkey federation – the JAKES program for young people, the Women in the Outdoors program and the Wheeling program for handicapped persons.

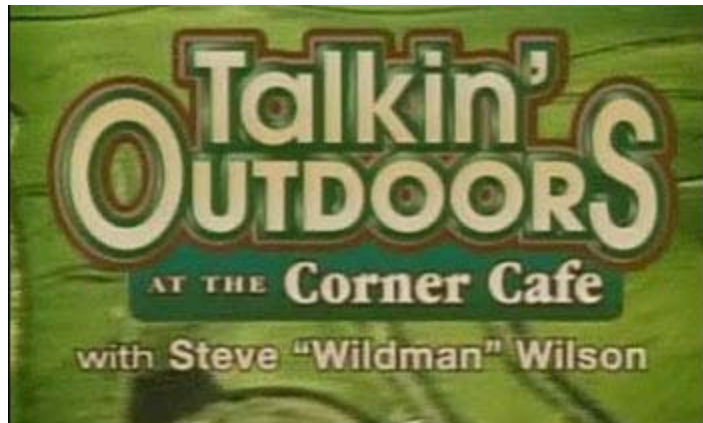
Through it all, Denton remains a fervent turkey hunter, looking forward to the challenges each season. He's a highly competent turkey caller, but something else is more necessary, he said. "Calling comes second. Knowing turkeys is more important. You have to know what a turkey is likely to do in different situations to be a good hunter."
