## Urban deer hunt applications now available

LITTLE ROCK – Due to increasing nuisance deer complaints, the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission and four Arkansas cities have joined together to offer limited urban archery hunts to combat the overpopulated deer herd.

Hunts in Horseshoe Bend, Cherokee Village, Bull Shoals and Hot Springs Village are scheduled for this fall. These special seasons require more of hunters than most, although it's worth the effort. Two hundred fifty applications will be randomly selected for each of the hunts with the exception of the Hot Springs Village hunt. During that hunt, 200 permits will be issued.

Chosen applicants must pass the International Bowhunter Education Program course before they attend a hunter-orientation class and take shooting proficiency tests. There are two options to meet the bowhunter education requirements. The first is to take the traditional eight-hour class (see schedule below). The second method is to take the classroom portion online then attend an IBEP Field Day to complete the requirement. The online class can be accessed at [www.nbef.org](http://www.nbef.org) and clicking the distance learning button. There is a \$20 charge for the online test. IBEP Field Days will be held after each hunter orientation meeting in each city so a hunter could meet all the requirements in one day using the online class option. Once a bowhunter has received his IBEP card it is good for life and recognized internationally.



The hunter-oriented shooting proficiency test for the Horseshoe Bend hunt will be Aug. 29 at Veteran's Park in Horseshoe Bend beginning at 1 p.m. For the Cherokee Village hunt, the hunter orientation and shooting test will be held Aug. 29 at the Baseheart Fire Station in Cherokee Village beginning at 8 a.m. The hunter orientation and shooting test for the Bull Shoals hunt will be Sept. 12 at the Bull Shoals Archery Range starting at 8 a.m. The Hot Springs Village hunter orientation and shooting proficiency test will be held at the Woodlands Community Center in Hot Springs Village beginning at 8 a.m.

Hunts in Horseshoe Bend and Cherokee Village will be held Sept. 8-Nov. 15 and Jan. 1-31, 2010. The Bull Shoals hunts will be held Sept. 14-Nov. 15 and Jan. 1-31, 2010. The hunt in Hot Springs Village will be Sept. 14-27. There is no bag limit, although the first deer taken by a hunter

must be a doe. Deer taken after that may be either sex. Hunters must donate their first deer to Arkansas Hunters Feeding the Hungry. Deer taken in the urban hunts do not count in a hunter's seasonal bag limit, and the three-point rule does not apply. Hunters must hold an Arkansas Sportsman's License and an Urban Bowhunting Permit.

A \$35 fee, which includes Arkansas Bowhunters Association membership, covers liability insurance. Only longbows, recurve bows or compound bows with at least 40-pound draw weight and arrowheads at least seven-eighths of an inch wide may be used. Hunters on private property must have written permission from the landowner. Other regulations also apply.

Pick up an application and a list of all regulations at Arkansas Game and Fish Commission headquarters, 2 Natural Resources Dr. in Little Rock or at the AGFC regional offices in Hot Springs, Calico Rock or Russellville. Applications must be postmarked by July 1. For more information on the hunts or to be mailed an urban hunt application, call the AGFC at (501) 223-6359.

### **Arkansas Youth Shooting Sports Program state championship is June 5-6**

LONOKE – If you're looking for fierce competition this weekend, look no further than the Arkansas Youth Shooting Sports Program state championship. The Arkansas Game and Fish Commission program winds down with the state championship June 5-6 at the Remington firing range in Lonoke. What started in 2006 with just over 900 kids has blossomed into a statewide phenomenon with over 4,000 youngsters competing across the state. On Friday, the top 64 junior squads will compete followed by the top 64 senior teams on Saturday - a total of 320 shooters each day will be competing. Competition begins each day at 8 a.m.

Through this competitive trap-shooting league, high-school-aged children have experienced the excitement of real-world shooting without the need for expensive hunting leases or equipment.

Young hunters have sharpened their skills and children who have no desire to pursue ducks, doves or other game still get to enjoy the challenge of shooting clay targets as they streak away. The program teaches safe gun-handling skills to children who may never take a hunter's education course and gives children from all backgrounds the chance to learn how much fun waits for them beyond the video screen.

Each team consists of at least five high-school-age members and a coach who has attended certification training through the AGFC. Teams can be all boys, all girls or a mixture of both. The junior division will compete on Friday, June 5 followed by the senior division on Saturday, June 6.

We have two classifications based on age, but that's the only thing we separate shooters by, AYSSP coordinator Chuck Woodson said. "Shooting a shotgun isn't a feat of strength. It's about coordination and concentration. In fact, we have many girls who can outshoot the boys," he said.

### **Free Fishing Days event covers two weekends in Arkansas**

LITTLE ROCK – Free Fishing Days of the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission will encompass two weekends this year, a change from past years in which only one Free Fishing Days weekend was offered. Free Fishing Days will start at noon Friday, June 5, through midnight Sunday, June 7 and again at noon Friday, June 12, through midnight Sunday, June 14. No sport fisherman, resident or non-resident, will be required to have a fishing license or a trout permit to fish anywhere in Arkansas during these times.



An annual tradition, Free Fishing Days furnishes many citizens and visitors with an opportunity to enjoy the popular outdoor activity. Free Fishing Days are part of the National Fishing Week celebration. Mike Armstrong, chief of fisheries for the AGFC, said the annual event is a lot of fun for employees as well as the public. "We want to encourage Arkansas people as well as visitors who come to our state, who may not be fishermen, to give it a try. We especially encourage parents to go fishing with their kids. Young people under 16 don't need a fishing license anyway, and if their moms and dads will go along, it can make a family outing that they'll all enjoy," Armstrong explained.

How do you get into fishing? Armstrong suggested that beginners make a stop at a sporting goods outlet, a boat dock or one of the AGFC regional offices for pointers on the basics of fishing in Arkansas. Open houses and fishing derbies for youngsters are planned at five state fish hatcheries in Arkansas June 13 from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. For more information on the derbies, phone the AGFC Fisheries Division office at (501) 223-6371. Youngsters 12 and under will be allowed to fish with the supervision of an adult. Children may catch and keep up to three catfish (or three trout at the Jim Hinkle Spring River State Fish Hatchery).

### Fishing versatility depends on your creativeness

LITTLE ROCK – If you are past the beginner stage as an Arkansas fisherman, chances are you have tried more than one venue, more than one method of angling.

This could be casting gear for largemouth bass, fly fishing equipment for trout, poles and minnows or jigs for crappie, even trotlines for catfish. Some items may be gathering dust now.

OK, do a bit of thinking, get the unused or little-used items out of storage and put them to work differently from what you originally intended, suggest some veteran anglers at the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission.

Crappie and bream fishing is not restricted to long cane poles or lengthy fiberglass rigs. Many Arkansans use these, though. A cane pole, bought or cut from a patch of cane, is a simple tool needing just fishing line attached to it. It is handy to have a line winder near the butt of the pole to store excess line. After all, those crappie or bream could be anywhere from 2 to 20 feet deep.

Even better for storing line is a fly reel. Yes, it's a strange mix, but it can work.

In fly fishing, the reel is for line storage, not for playing and landing a fish. The same principle applies to poles. You let out line to the desired distance then flip or swing a bait or a jig to the spot you think a fish is lurking. Get a hit, and you raise the rod then swing the fish to you or into the boat.

The reel or the line winder isn't in use during this process except to take up excess line.

Depending on the type, a fly fishing reel may easily be made to fit a cane pole. If not, some rigging with tape or even clamps could be needed. Consider small hose clamps if necessary to fasten the fly reel to the pole.

Why not just use the fly rod with the reel? OK, try it, but the fly rod may be too limber for the crappie and bream work you have in mind.

Another line of thinking applies to lures and cane poles. Sure they can be teamed.

A small crank bait can be tied on a line from a cane pole then tossed into position and worked with short jerks or in a figure eight pattern. You are focusing on an area of just a few feet, not a long retrieve like is used in bass fishing.

Jigs can be dropped into openings just a few inches wide with a cane pole. This is an ancient method that was modified into the California-birthered flippin' technique back in the 1970s.



Take a look at some of that gear gathering dust. You might find it handy beyond the plan for which you originally acquired it.
