This is the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission's fishing report for **December 10**. If there is a body of water you would like included in this report, please call or e-mail us with information on possible sources for that lake or river.

**Fishing Tip:** Winter is jig-fishing time, but many anglers are intimidated by the bass jig. In truth, it's very similar to fishing a soft-plastic worm. Deeper water near creek channels with brush or stumps are prime jig-fishing waters. Keep casts within 30 yards and pay close attention to the line for movement, and you won't notice much difference between fishing a Texas rig and a jig. Pay special attention during the initial fall, as most hits come when the jig is dropping.

**Statewide Family and Community Fishing Report:** Rainbow trout fishing has been excellent in Rogers, Springdale and Central Arkansas ponds. The anglers report that they have been using corn, small marshmallows, Power Bait, Trout Magnets, Rooster Tails and spinners. More ponds will be stocked this week. For stocking information, call the Hotline at 1-866-540-FISH (3474) toll free.

## CENTRAL ARKANSAS

**Lake Conway:** Bates Field and Stream (501-470-1846) said the water is 1 1/2 to 2 feet low. Bream are fair on worms and crickets. Crappie are fair on chartreuse/white pepper jigs and minnows fished around 1 to 2 feet deep. Catfishing is good on yo-yos and trotlines with many anglers catching limits before daylight.

Dan at Gold Creek Landing said bream are slow. Crappie fishing is fair. Bass are slow. Catfishing is fair.

**Little Red River:** [Lindsey's Resort](#) (501-302-3139) said the water is on the low side with generators running for only an hour or so a day. Trout fishing is good on Power Bait, nightcrawlers and wax worms floated with a

marshmallow.

Jed Hollan at the **Little Red Fly Shop** said the only water releases at the Greers Ferry project in the past few weeks occurred on Nov. 21, Dec. 5 and Dec. 8. They were all small releases with short duration. Wade fishing has been possible and productive somewhere on the Little Red every day. The average temperature of the water flowing through the turbines has been 52 degrees. The average dissolved oxygen content of that water was 4.3 parts per million with a high DO level of 6.5 ppm. Incredible spawn reports keep coming in every day. At Winkley Shoal and elsewhere, the same redds (fish "nests") are being used repeatedly. Wade fishermen report spotting at least 100 brown trout over 20 inches long with a few pushing 30 inches in body length. One angler, Ryan Burks, had a trout on his fly that took all his fly line and 100 yards of backing before it broke off. Ryan told me the trout was over 30 inches in length. Anglers are reporting catches (and releases) of over 50 brown trout per day per angler. One experienced fly fisherman commented to me that he did not have enough skill to land some of the larger ones he has been seeing. Excitement is in the air as our spawn continues into its second month. Aquatic insect hatches continue as per previous reports. Midges, caddis flies and mayflies are the primary cast of characters. The dry flies that are working, and they are working, include the midge (#22; cream or black), para Adams (#18), blue winged olive mayfly (baetis, #18-#22), tan elk hair caddis (#18-#20) and crackleback (#14). If you are testing your skills below the surface, try a sowbug (#14; UV tan, UV light gray, peacock or olive), zebra midge (#16; red or black), egg pattern (#12-#14; roe, peach, salmon or watermelon), pheasant tail (#16), gold ribbed hare's ear (#14-#16), copper john (#14-#16), San Juan worm (#12-#14; red, fl. cerise or worm brown), red butt soft hackle (#14-#16) and woolly bugger (#8-#10; olive, brown or black).

**Greers Ferry:** As of Tuesday, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers reports the lake's elevation at 460.39 feet MSL.

**Tommy Cauley of Fish Finder Guide Service** said the water level is rising slightly. Bass fishing is good. Many shallow fish are being caught on crankbaits and jigs fished around any wood cover in the water. Deeper fish are being caught on football head jigs and Carolina-rigged lizards fished 15-30 feet deep. Walleye are staging around The Narrows. Crappie are biting well around pole timber on minnows and jigs. Sunny days are producing the best. White bass and hybrids are being caught on mid-lake humps with in-line spinners, spoons, hair jigs and swim baits. Find the bait and the fish will be close.

Shiloh Marina (501-825-6237) had no report.

**Harris Brake Lake: Coffee Creek Landing** (501-889-2745) said bream fishing is slow. Crappie are fair. Bass are fair. Catfish are slow.

**Lake Overcup: Overcup Landing** (501-354-9007) said the water is clear and at normal level. Bream are fair on redworms and crickets. Crappie are slow, but a few have been caught around docks on white Crappie Stingers. Bass and catfish are slow.

Lakeview Landing (501-354-1470) had no report.

**Brewer Lake: Overcup Landing** (501-354-9007) said the water is clear and at normal levels. Bream are fair on worms and crickets. Crappie are slow. Bass are slow. Catfish are slow.

**Lake Maumelle: Jolly Roger's Marina** said largemouths and Kentucky bass are biting well in 20 feet of water on jigs and CC spoons. The best fishing is along channel drops. White bass are biting well near the main channel. Saturday they were right in front of the marina, Sunday in front of the sailing club. Crappie are biting well on the edges of the main channel and are hitting on red/white jigs and minnows.

**JB's Guide Service** said the last few weeks have been feast or famine. There is periodic success on crappie and bass. Just look for the tell-tale shad for a shot at a school of whites. Crappie are relatively deep. The best fishing has been between fronts.

Hatchet Jack's Sport Shop said the water is clear and at normal level. Bream are biting well on worms. Crappie are biting well on red/white jigs tipped with a minnow. Bass are biting well on Texas-rigged Baby Brush Hogs. Catfishing is good on cut bait and nightcrawlers.

**Lake Pickthorne:** Hatchet Jack's Sport Shop had no report.

**Arkansas River in Little Rock:** Vince Miller from **Fish 'N Stuff** said fishing is fair on the river. All species are biting fairly well, but it's the typical slowdown for the river in winter.

**Sunset Lake:** Turbyfill's Outdoor Sports (501-315-3061) said the water is high. Bream are fair on crickets. Crappie are poor. Bass are fair on swimming grubs. Catfish are slow.

**Saline River Access in Benton:** Turbyfill's Outdoor Sports (501-315-3061) said the water is high. Bream are

biting well on Tennessee shad grubs. Crappie are fair on grubs. Bass are biting well on 3- to 4-inch jerkbaits. Catfishing is slow.

**Arkansas River at Morrilton:** Charley's Hidden Harbor in Oppelo said the water is clearing up and there's good flow in the river. Catfishing is very good in deep holes on skipjack fillets fished 30 feet or deeper in the main channel. White bass are fair near the creek mouths late in the day. Stripers below dams 9 and 10 are fair on wobble spoons tipped with a bit of shad or skipjack. Kentucky bass are fair on Rat-L-Traps fished around 3 to 4 feet deep on jetty points.

**Little Maumelle River:** Hatchet Jack's Sport Shop said crappie are biting well on red/chartreuse and pink/white jigs as well as pink minnows.

**Murray Lock and Dam:** Hatchet Jack's Sport Shop said crappie are biting fairly well on minnows fished under a slip-cork. Catfishing is excellent on shad and live sunfish. Stripers are biting well below the dam.

**Terry Lock and Dam:** McSwain Sports Center (501-945-2471) said the water is at normal levels. Crappie are biting well on black/chartreuse jigs and minnows. All other species are slow.

**Clear Lake:** McSwain Sports Center (501-945-2471) said the water is at normal level. Bream are biting well on redworms. All other fishing is slow.

**Peckerwood Lake:** Herman's Landing said the lake is closed to fishing until Feb. 1.

## NORTH ARKANSAS

**White River:** Sportsman's White River Resort had no report.

John Berry from Berry Brothers Guide Service said with the lower flows on the White, there has been more challenging boat navigation. All of the rocks we have been flying over for the last several months are now poking out and looking for your boat. It is time to put your low water propeller back on and slow down a bit. Be on the look out for navigation hazards. Remember that the river will be changed from the flooding this spring. This will be the first time we see several spots that have been under a lot of water since then. The river from the state park down to White Hole has been fishing well in the lower water. The go-to flies during the past week have been brightly colored egg patterns. The best color seems to change every day. Be sure and carry a variety of colors that include pink, peach and orange. Other productive flies have been sowbugs, olive scuds and zebra midges. Olive woolly buggers on sink-tip lines are also producing some nice fish. The catch-and-release section at Rim Shoals also is fishing well. The fishing has been better in the morning. With the current level of generation, there is a significant amount of wading available. While a significant amount of it is available by trail even more is accessible by boat. If you do not have access to a boat, stop by Rim Shoals Trout Dock and take advantage of their water taxi. For a nominal fee they will drop you off at one of the spots available and pick you up later in the day.

**Bull Shoals Lake:** As of Tuesday, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers reports the lake's elevation at 653.61 feet MSL.

**Lake Norfolk:** As of Tuesday, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers reports the lake's elevation at 552.38 feet MSL.

**101 Grocery and Bait** said the water temperature is in the 50-degree range. Bluegill and crappie fishing has been good. Heavy water generation during the last week has dropped the water 4 feet. This has helped move the crappie and bluegill to the brush piles. White bass fishing has been good using jiggging spoons. Striper fishing is slow, but some are being caught on shiners. Smallmouth and largemouth bass fishing are fair. Kentucky bass are biting well. Catfishing is fair.

**Norfolk Tailwater:** John Berry from Berry Brothers Guide Service said the fishing on the Norfolk has been a bit spotty. One day it is excellent and the next day slow. The better fishing has been in the afternoon and the upper river seems to be fishing better than the lower river. The go-to flies have been micro San Juan worms in pink and worm brown. Orange egg patterns also have done very well. In the higher water, you will have to fish with substantial amounts of weight. Concentrate on fishing the banks and grass beds. Dry Run Creek is fishing well as always. The hot flies have been sowbugs, San Juan worms, egg patterns and olive woolly buggers.

**Spring River:** **Spring River Fly Shop** said water levels are running very low with great clarity. Tuesday's rain will help bring water levels back up to normal. There have been heavy hatches of white midges this week. Caddis and mayfly hatches have not been steady but nymphs are thick on the river bottom. Have been having

great success with mayfly emergers made with ostrich herl and small white woolly buggers tied with white ostrich herl on size 12 hooks. The fish have really been concentrating on the bottom this week.

### NORTHWEST ARKANSAS

**Beaver Lake:** As of Tuesday, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers reports the lake's elevation at 1,121.64 feet MSL.

**JT's Crappie Guide Service** (479-640-3980) said bass have been biting crayfish-colored crankbaits along chunk rock and gravel banks and jig-and-pigs around docks. Crappie fishing has been decent. The best bait has been minnows fished in and around brush piles near creek channels 15 to 25 feet deep. Striped bass and white bass have been around Point 12 and upstream either river. Shad and jigging spoons have been the best bait.

Catfish have been biting well all day and evening from the bank on cut bait or liver.

Bluegill have been biting well under docks 5 to 10 feet deep on crickets.

Southtown Sporting Goods (479-443-7148) said the water is clear. Crappie are biting well on minnows fished in brush piles 10 to 15 feet deep. Bass are biting excellently on jigs, crankbaits and spinnerbaits fished 8 to 15 feet deep.

**Lake Fayetteville:** Lake Fayetteville Boat Dock (479-444-3476) said the water is clear, but the fishing is very slow. Not many anglers are on the water.

**Lake Sequoyah:** Lake Sequoyah Boat Dock (479-444-3475) said fishing is on the slow side. Bream are slow on worms and crickets. Crappie are very slow on minnows. Bass are fair on spinnerbaits and soft-plastics. Catfishing is fair on worms.

**Sugarloaf Lake:** Midland Minimart (479-639-9467) had no report.

### NORTHEAST ARKANSAS

**Henry Gray Hurricane Lake WMA:** Judy Potts of Judy's Bait Shoppe said that while duck season is in mid-season, a few fishermen are having real good luck catching crappie on yo-yos and limb lines along Glaise Creek and up around Little Hurricane Lake using small to medium minnows. The main gate is closed and interior roads are flooded in places. All lakes are accessible by boat.

**Lake Charles:** [Lake Charles State Park](#) (870-878-6595) had no report.

**Crown Lake:** [Boxhound Marina](#) (870-670-4496) said bass fishing is actually good right now on a jig-and-pig combo fished around 10 feet deep. There aren't a lot of bass being caught each day, but the ones that are caught are good fish. A 7 lb. 6 oz. fish was brought in last week.

**Lake Frierson:** [Lake Frierson State Park](#) said no one is fishing.

### SOUTHEAST ARKANSAS

**Lake Monticello:** Fishing guide Greg Gullede (870-723-3928) with Basshunters Custom Crankbaits said bass fishing on Lake Monticello has really slowed and there are not many anglers fishing. The crappie fishing is spotty on minnows and jigs. The whites are biting when you find them on jigs, minnows and spoons.

**Lake Chicot:** No report.

**Grand Lake:** No report.

## SOUTH CENTRAL ARKANSAS

**Moro Bay:** [Moro Bay State Park](#) at the junction of the Ouachita River, Raymond Lake and Moro Bay said recent rains have brought the river up a couple feet above its normal level. Crappie were biting well, but cooler temperatures and rain have thinned out the anglers. However, it safe to assume that since the water has cleared up and remained mostly steady in the last 24 hours, crappie will be biting again. Submerged trees in the lake and bay are the best places this time of year. White and chartreuse jigs work well. Shiners are also good but are hard to find, area so buy them before you come. A few bream have been caught on worms buy those seeking crappie. Nothing has been said recently of bass or catfish. Don't forget to dress warm and wear some orange.

**Lower Ouachita River:** No report.

**Tri-County Lake:** No report.

## SOUTHWEST ARKANSAS

**Millwood Lake:** As of Tuesday, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers reports the lake's elevation at 259.97 feet MSL.

**Millwood Lake Guide Service** said vegetation and floating mats remain in Little River, due to current. As of Monday, the main lake water surface temperature ranges from 52 to 57 degrees, depending on location and time of day. Current in Little River is 216 CFS as of Monday, 08 December. Main lake clarity is about 7-12 inches away from any remaining current in Little River. River clarity is 12-15 inches and improving. All USACE boat ramps and campgrounds are open, as of Monday. Millwood State Park has one operational boat ramp and one still under repair. Most bass schooling activities have ended on Millwood during the last 2 weeks of cooling temperatures. Bass from 2 pounds and up to 4 pounds each, remain good to fair on Rat-L-Traps at random periods throughout the day, mostly in the heat of the afternoon. War Eagle Spinnerbaits, dead-sticked trick worms, and Bass Assassin Shad jerk baits are still working around the remaining vegetation and dying lily pads. Bass were still somewhat aggressive in Horseshoe and McGuire oxbow lakes upriver this week, but chasing shad deep in the lily pads for the most part, has ended. Jigs have begun to incite a few good keepers over the past couple weeks. The best jig colors have been peanut butter and jelly, pumpkinseed/chartreuse or black/blue/purple. Pitching jigs and 10" worms to stumps near deep water is working along Little River and in the main lake. Fish the edges of any remaining lily pads near deep drops in the clearer water or along Little River, several feet away from the base of cypress trees and stumps in vegetation or on drop offs to deeper water. The schools of white bass were found biting aggressively again between Highway 71 bridge and Cossatot River. Best bet over the past week for Whites, were Rooster Tails, Little Cleos, and spoons. The crappie bite continues improving along with the improved clarity along Little River on live shiners and jigs. Best depth over the past week was between 6-9 feet over planted brush piles, along Little River and in front of Mud Lake entrance to Little River. Blues and Channel Cats remain good this week, using trotlines, or yo-yos along any remaining current in Little River, and remain best for 2-5 pounders using Charlie, cut shad, home-made blood bait, or chicken livers.

**Cossatot River:** Davy Ashcraft at [Cossatot River State Park](#) (870-385-2201) had no report.

**Lake Columbia:** Steve's Marine (870-234-2222) said the water is at normal levels. Bream are fair. Crappie are biting well on jigs and shiners. Catfishing is good on cold worms.

**Lake Erling:** Steve's Marine (870-234-2222) said the water is low. Catfishing is good on nightcrawlers. Crappie are biting well on live shiners.

**White Oak Lake:** [White Oak Lake State Park](#) had no report.

**Lake Greeson:** As of Tuesday, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers reports the lake's elevation was not available.

Darryl Morris of [Family Fishing Trips Guide Service](#) said crappie are excellent on live bait and jigs fished 17-21 feet deep. Some bass are being caught in the same areas and don't be surprised is you hook into a stray striper. Surface temperature is 53 degrees and the lake level is 537.84 msl.

Lakeside Grocery (870-398-5304) had no report.

**DeGray Lake:** As of Tuesday, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers reports the lake's elevation at 407.17 feet MSL.

Local angler George Graves said the water is clear and surface temperature is 52 degrees. Crappie fishing has slowed but is still fairly good. Some fish are showing up on the deeper brush in 30 feet. The bigger fish are still on the structure in 22 to 25 feet of water. Use 1/16-ounce crappie jigs in red/chartreuse/white or one and a half inch tubes in black/chartreuse. Also as the water gets colder, minnows will work better than jigs. Fish are still about 15 feet down over the thickest part of the brush. Try between Caddo Drive and Shouse Ford. Also quite a few big bream are over the brush. Try redworms and crickets. A few bream are being caught on crappie jigs. Bass are still slow due to lack of vegetation and high water. You can catch a few by fishing the deep (20-25 feet), steep sides of points and ledges. Look for any rock or wood cover. Use a jig and trailer or small finesse worms. Dark colors work best in deep water. The best fishing in the winter is uplake from Caddo Drive. No reports on catfish. Now is the time to put out those fish attractors for both crappie and bass. DeGray One Stop (501-865-3511) said very few anglers are stopping by the shop. No report.

## WEST-CENTRAL ARKANSAS

**Lake Dardanelle:** Eric Pratt at **Lake Dardanelle State Park** said the water is fairly clear in Lake Dardanelle. Water temperature is 49 degrees. The average daily release is expected to be 5,000-10,000 cubic feet per second. Bass fishing is good with anglers reporting successful days fishing. The morning seems to be the best time to catch a limit. Successful anglers are using black spinnerbaits, black/blue jigs and slowly-retrieved shad-colored crankbaits. Crappie fishing has slowed some but should get better with the change in weather this week. Fishing with minnows in 5-10 feet of water near submerged structure and brush piles should lead to some fish in the boat. Bream fishing is fair using crickets, worms and small minnows. Catfish are slow.

Murphy's Sporting Goods (479-229-3200) said not many people are fishing. Bass are slow, but a few have come on Rat-L-Traps and diving crankbaits. Catfishing is fair on cut shad and nightcrawlers.

**Spadra Marina** had no report.

**Ozark Pool:** Lakeside Food Mart (479-667-5155) said the water is at normal level. Crappie are biting well in 8 to 10 feet of water in the creeks on minnows. A few bass have been caught on spinnerbaits and jigs in backwater areas.

**Lake Ouachita:** As of Tuesday, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers reports the lake's elevation at 577.04 feet MSL.

**Mountain Harbor Resort** said the water is clear and at 65 degrees. Largemouth bass are still biting well on spinnerbaits and lipless crankbaits. Spoons are effective, fished vertically, near humps and main-lake points 20 to 25 feet deep. Walleye are fair and being caught on spoons over brush piles on main-lake points. Stripers are good on live bait with shad or trotline minnows. White ½-oz. jigs and ¾-oz spoons are still working as well. Bream are fair on worms in 18 to 25 feet of water. Crappie are very good and being caught over brush and moss beds. Try brush in water 15 to 20 feet deep. Minnows or crappie grubs are still working best. Tennessee shad and white are still the best colors for artificial baits. Catfish are fair and being caught on cut bait and live bait hung from jugs or trotlines.

Larry Hurley from **Poorman's Guide Service** said fishing continues to be fair for bass and stripers. The bass are going from fall patterns to winter patterns, so get ready to throw the reliable jig-and-pig in green colors and black/blue. Stripers are fair on spoons and buck tail jigs in gray.

Dave Lindhag at **Striped Bass Adventures** said the stripers are biting pretty well. Some decent size fish are coming on small- to medium-sized live bait fished at 25 feet deep using light sinkers. All fingers of the lake are productive, but the fish really aren't in the main lake. Some mornings, fishing has been fast and other mornings, it's been a slow start. Most of the fish caught have been in the 7 to 12 pound range. Some sporadic topwater action is happening, but it's rare.

**Lake Hamilton:** Larry Hurley from **Poorman's Guide Service** said fishing is good on green pumpkin Carolina-rigged centipedes and crayfish-colored crankbaits fished around clay banks.

**Lake Catherine:** Shane Goodner, owner of **Catch'em All Guide Service**, said that the Corps is operating a continuous flow of water from Blakely, Carpenter, and Rammel Dam in an effort to bring Lake Ouachita down to elevation 575 by Christmas. The 3-foot drawdown of Catherine should be completed soon. The lake will remain 3

feet below normal pool until mid-March. Rainbow trout fishing below the dam has been fair with anglers using many methods to catch trout. Fly-fishermen have done well with small streamers in the current as rainbows chase injured shad. Micro-jigs in white or black are also producing along with the San Juan worm fished under a strike indicator. Bank fishermen using Power Bait and nightcrawlers have recorded limits in areas of low current. Boaters are landing larger trout by trolling the channels with small crankbaits that imitate minnows and crayfish. Rainbow trout are an opportunistic fish and will actively feed on whatever nature provides, so fishermen are able to take advantage of this fact. Trout fishing will become much better in January as the stocking program intensifies. Guided trips that produce 50 or more fish are common during the months of January and February. Little striper and hybrid fishing as gone on this past week as many of the fish have moved away from the dam as the live shad population seeks warmer water.

Diamondhead Marina had no report.

**Lake Hinkle:** Bill's Bait Shop (479-637-4719) said the lake is in pretty good shape. Crappie are biting well on minnows fished 12 to 15 feet deep with occasional fish coming from 20 feet deep. Bass are biting well.

**Lake Atkins:** Lucky Landing (479-641-7615) said the water is clear and low. Bream are fair. Crappie are biting well. Bass have slowed. Catfish are biting well on live and prepared bait cast from the bank.

### EAST ARKANSAS

**Arkansas River (Pine Bluff):** The Tackle Box (870) 534-1948 said the water is fairly clear for the river. Bream are fair. Crappie are biting well on minnows and jigs. Bass are biting fairly well on crankbaits and jig-and-pig combos. Catfish are fair.

**White River:** Triangle Sports (870-793-7122) said the water is low and has a little color to it. Crappie are trying to get fired up, but it's still very slow.

**Maddox Bay:** Maddox Bay Landing (870-462-8317) said crappie are biting well on minnows. Bass are biting well on medium-diving crankbaits.

**Bear Creek Lake:** Arkansas Outdoors (870-295-4240) said only two boats were on the lake last weekend and they didn't catch anything. The water clarity is good and the water is at normal levels.

**Horseshoe Lake:** Local angler Clyde Gregory said the water clarity is good. Bream are fair. Crappie are fair. Bass fishing is poor. Catfish are biting well on stinkbait.

**I-40 Chute:** James Sample at Daily's Boat Dock said the water clarity is good and the water is low. No anglers are visiting the water because of cold weather and duck season.
